Upon completion, a self-evaluation is turned in and a student-faculty evaluation conference is held.</p> <p>Internships and Employment: A student's proficiency/knowledge is often demonstrated by full or part-time employment at recognized professional, community and educational theatres and/or acceptance into and successful completion of graduate program[s]. The accomplishments of each student are assessed during his/her Annual Review and through Surveys of Former Students.</p> <p>Survey of former students: Surveys of former Theatre majors are periodically conducted to determine their present employment records, accomplishments and goals, as well as their assessment of the quality of their education in Theatre at CSU.</p>
